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Opening Keynote

We All Have a Story to Tell Linda Rosenberg, MSW, President and CEO National Council for Behavioral Health



As behavioral health professionals, we understand that behavioral illnesses are a leading cause of disability and premature death. These brain diseases impact all of us – personally or within our families and friends and certainly in our professional life. We have innovative and successful treatment interventions. We have the promise of insurance parity and routine coverage of behavioral illnesses on par with physical illnesses. However, too often, our healthcare system offers an inadequate response and few individuals and families can get the care they need. This session offers parallel insights in our healthcare system through the lens of a behavioral health leader, advocate, practitioner, and patient. We all have a story to tell.

Linda Rosenberg is President and CEO of the National Council for Behavioral Health. Under her leadership the National Council has become the nation's largest mental health and addiction education and advocacy association with 2800 government and not-for-profit member organizations serving 10 million Americans.

The National Council helped secure passage of the federal parity law and the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA); advanced the integration of behavioral health and primary care, leading to the creation of a Medicaid Health Home option; ensured passage of the Excellence in Mental Health Act; and introduced Mental Health First Aid in the U.S.A.

General Sessions

How to Manage Managed Care Joe Parks, MD, Medical Director, National Council for Behavioral Health



Transitioning from state Medicaid operated fee-for-service to a contracted managed care organization payment model introduces a more complicated set of business and reporting relationships. Successfully managing them requires maintaining the provider relationship with the Medicaid agency and building new relationships with multiple managed-care organizations. It requires increased data reporting and analytic and negotiation skills involving data on clinical outcomes, utilization, and rates. This session will discuss the internal incentives and constraints for both the Medicaid agencies that are contracting with the managed-care organizations and the managed-care organizations themselves. We will discuss specific challenges in these new complicated relationships and specific opportunities to utilize data and contract language to achieve a successful implementation and ongoing clinical & business model.

Dr. Parks is the Medical Director for the National Council for Behavioral Health. He has nearly two decades of experience with public health. He was named director of the Missouri HealthNet Division of the Missouri Department of Social Services in 2013. He also holds the position of Distinguished Research Professor of Science at the University of Missouri – St. Louis and is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Missouri, Department of Psychiatry in Columbia.

He practices psychiatry on an outpatient basis at Family Health Center, a federally funded community health center established to expand services to uninsured and underinsured patients in central Missouri.



Mental Health Parity & Addiction Equity Act - Parity@10

This October marks the 10 year anniversary of the enactment of the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act (MHPAEA). Since enactment much work has been done to implement the law and improve access to mental health and addiction treatment services. However, more work is necessary to meet the letter and the spirit of the law. The Parity at 10 Campaign is a multi-year effort to raise awareness and advocate for greater enforcement of the Parity law in 10 states. This session will focus on a discussion of the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act of 2008, the Parity at 10 Campaign from a national and state perspective, and advocacy strategies to raise awareness and strengthen enforcement of the law to promote access to behavioral health services.

Ellen Weber, J.D., Vice President for Health Initiatives, the Legal Action Center



Ellen Weber, J.D., is the Vice President for Health Initiatives at the Legal Action Center, a law and policy organization whose mission is to fight discrimination against individuals with histories of addiction, HIV/AIDS, or criminal records, and to advocate for sound public policies in these areas. Ms. Weber helps lead the Center's efforts to expand access to comprehensive and equitable substance use treatment at both the state and federal levels. Ms. Weber worked previously at the Center from 1985 to 2002, during which time she conducted disability rights litigation, established the Center's D.C. office, and led the Center's national policy work. She led the field's efforts to obtain protections for persons with substance abuse disorders under the Americans With Disabilities Act, participated in the first round of national health care reform legislation and advocated for a more balanced federal budget for the prevention and treatment of substance use disorders.


Sara Howe, MS, CHES, CEO, Illinois Association for Behavioral Health



Sara Moscato Howe, MS, CHES, is Chief Executive Officer of the Illinois Association for Behavioral Health (IABH). Her responsibilities include state and federal policy analysis and advocacy efforts on behalf of the IABH's Membership. Ms. Howe also oversees the planning and implementation of the Association's substance abuse prevention programs: Operation Snowball (OS) and the Cebrin Goodman Teen Institute (CGTI). She is Chair of the Illinois Department of Human Services Social Services Advisory Council, a member of Illinois' Human Services Commission, and serves as Public Policy Chair of the National Council for Behavioral Health. Ms. Howe holds a Master of Science in Health Promotion with a research emphasis in collegiate peer alcohol abuse prevention a Bachelor of Arts in Health Promotion from Purdue University. She is currently pursuing a Master of Business Administration degree from the Krannert School of Management at Purdue University. She is a member of the Animal Protective League of Springfield and Sangamon County and has previously served on their Board of Directors.



Lori Criss, MSW, Chief Executive Officer, Ohio Council of Behavioral Health & Family Services Providers



Lori Criss, MSW, is Chief Executive Officer of The Ohio Council of Behavioral Health & Family Services Providers, representing addiction treatment and prevention, mental health, and family services providers. Lori has over 20 years of operations and leadership experience with addictions and trauma treatment, housing, and family services. Currently, she advocates for policies and resources that promote access to a full continuum of prevention, treatment and recovery services for people with mental illness and substance use disorders; to enforce insurance coverage parity for mental illness and substance use disorders; to create housing choice for people with substance use disorders; and to end Ohio's opiate crisis and rising suicide rates.

Carletta C. Murnane, MBA, Senior Advisor for Health Investigations, Employee Benefits Security Administration, Cincinnati Regional Office of the U.S. Department of Labor

Carletta C. Murnane is the Senior Advisor for Health Investigations for the Employee Benefits Security Administration, Cincinnati Regional Office of the U. S. Department of Labor, which covers the States of Ohio, Kentucky, Michigan and Southern Indiana. As the Senior Advisor for Health Investigations, Ms. Murnane oversees the Cincinnati Regional Office's health investigative activities dealing with the Employee Benefits Security Administration's enforcement of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Ms. Murnane prior to assuming this position in November 2014, was the Supervisory Benefits Advisor for the Cincinnati Regional Office for five years and also served as an Auditor/Investigator in the Cincinnati Regional Office for eight years. As an Auditor/Investigator, Ms. Murnane was responsible for enforcement and compliance activities pursuant to the ERISA, which included conducting both civil and criminal investigations. Additionally, she has previously served as the Cincinnati Regional Office's Voluntary Fiduciary Corrections Program Coordinator; Abandoned Plan Program Coordinator; and Rapid ERISA Action Team (REACT) Coordinator.

Community Behavioral Health Mergers David Guth, MSSW, CEO, Centerstone



The healthcare industry is undergoing a new wave of consolidations, and much of this current wave features not-for-profit mergers ranging from the small single community agency to multibillion dollar health systems. For most CEOs and boards it is a daunting challenge to consider why, when, and who to consolidate with, let alone how to approach the process. This presentation will feature David Guth discussing how to think about the benefits and challenges of consolidation and how the analysis of this activity emanates from the strategic planning process. He will also discuss his marriage model for the exploration, consummation, and post- closing tasks associated with not-for-profit mergers. Mr. Guth is CEO of Centerstone. With annual revenues approaching \$400 million, Centerstone is the result of the consolidation of 19 organizations.

David Guth, MSSW, is Chief Executive Officer and co-founder of Centerstone, one of the nation's largest behavioral healthcare providers. The non-profit organization, headquartered in Nashville, Tennessee, serves nearly 180,000 individuals in communities in Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee, and nationwide through its national provider network.

Guth has served in the capacity of chief executive for Centerstone since 1991. With over 40 years of behavioral healthcare experience, 33 in executive leadership, his experience and expertise comprise a vast number of areas, both business and clinical.

He has presented extensively before national and international audiences on the adoption of information technology in the healthcare industry, the integration of behavioral and primary healthcare, and the importance of improving the field of behavioral health through research-driven protocols. His insights on these topics and others have been featured in numerous professional journals. Under his leadership, the organization has grown from \$6M in revenues and 300 staff serving 2,000 individuals to revenues of \$327M and 5,200 staff serving nearly 180,000 people each year through 1,250 partnership locations and 211 facilities. In addition, Centerstone contracts with over 700 specialty credentialed clinicians nationwide.





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
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Getting to Value in Integrated Managed Care:

He has extensive experience collaborating with government partners at all levels, building consensus diverse stakeholders, and moving projects from conception to completion. His background in providing direct service offers an important perspective for determining the impact of policy on communities, families, and individuals.

Prior to joining Success, Mike spent five years as a senior policy analyst with the County Commissioners Association of Ohio, worked for the Ohio Legislative Budget Office, and the Ohio Supreme Court. Mike served as President of the Ohio Lobbying Association (OLA) and was a member of the OLA Board of Trustees for seven years. She lives in Worthington with her husband and two sons.

Karen Kasler is a lifelong Ohioan. She grew up in Lancaster, attended Otterbein College in Westerville, and found her first professional break at WCBE-FM, Columbus. Karen was selected as a Fellow in the Kiplinger Program for Mid-Career Journalists at The Ohio State University in 1994. After earning her Master's Degree in that program, she worked at WBNS-TV in Columbus and then moved north to become the afternoon drive anchor/assignment editor for WTAM-AM, Cleveland.

Karen followed the demolition and rebuilding of Cleveland Browns Stadium, produced award-winning series on identity theft and the Y2K panic, covered the Republican National Convention in 2000 and the blackout of 2003, and reported annually from the Cleveland National Air Show each year, often going upside down in an aerobatic plane to do it. In 1999, she was a media witness to the execution of Wilford Berry, at the time the first man put to death since Ohio re-instated capital punishment. Karen frequently reported for ABC Radio News, and also coproduced an award-winning nationally-distributed documentary on the one-year anniversary of September 11, 2001, which featured her interview with Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge from the West Wing of the White House.





As a senior public affairs reporter, Ms. Candisky identifies, researches, analyzes and reports on political and government news for publication in print and digital formats. Working under daily deadline pressure, she strives to inform readers how government impacts their lives.

In addition to print reporting, she provides political and government analysis with regular appearances on television and radio news programs.

Prior to joining the Dispatch's political team, Ms. Candisky covered the Ohio Supreme Court, federal and county courts and criminal justice.



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
